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Council update

The fifth meeting of Council for 2021-22 was held on Monday 21 March 2022. At this meeting we had the pleasure of welcoming Sharon Betridge as a new Council member.

To celebrate ANZSI National Indexing Day this year, a special Zoom webinar was held on Thursday 31 March, featuring two sessions. One presentation was given by Juliet Richters covering "Using 'soft marketing' to build your indexing business"; the other was presented by Mary Coe and explored "Whom should we aim to please when creating book indexes?". Both sessions were very well received with 18 members attending. A summary of both sessions appears elsewhere in this newsletter.

Victorian members also celebrated the NID with a lunch hosted by Karen Gillen which I attended on Wednesday 2 March. A short report appears in this newsletter.

At the Council meeting I outlined my discussion with ICRIS representatives whereby those societies which held online virtual annual conferences and recorded the sessions, may consider the possibility of other societies re-broadcasting these to their members. Council recommended that this rebroadcast should also include a fee negotiated by mutual agreement between the societies. For ANZSI members geographically distant from other society conferences and at a disadvantage from attending online due to time zones, this was seen as a real bonus and benefit to ANZSI members.

Routine matters included reports on correspondence, finances, membership, ANZSI Library, Accreditation Committee and Awards Committee. Both the Vice President position description and the Secretary position description were updated.

New ANZSI Education Officer

I would like to introduce myself to members as the ANZSI Education Officer.

I have been a professional indexer and metadata specialist for 30 years, working in a variety of formats and media (including books, journals, databases and websites) and in a wide range of subject areas.

I have been an active ANZSI member since 2007 and have held various roles on committees and Council. I currently work as a metadata specialist at the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, and I am Editor of *The Indexer: The International Journal of Indexing*. I am also a PhD student at the School of Information and Communication Studies at Charles Sturt University, conducting research on e-book indexes. I recently submitted my doctoral thesis for examination and




hope to graduate later this year. I will then be reporting on my findings in articles and presentations and hopefully continuing with further research on use of indexes. You can read more about my background on my <u>LinkedIn page</u>.

The Education Officer role involves developing, managing and promoting indexing training and professional development (PD) activities. Several other indexing societies offer online training courses for new indexers (see the ANZSI website for details), and rather than duplicate those efforts, my focus this year will be on developing and organising professional development (PD) activities. Karen Gillen, the previous Education Officer, has passed on to me many ideas from society members for PD sessions. Thank you to Karen for her work and for compiling that list, there is a lot to cover! Members have suggested presentations about quoting, handling the metatopic, indexing various types of media and materials (such as images, cookbooks and newsletters), and using software (including not just dedicated indexing software but additional programs such as Microsoft Word and Adobe InDesign). The online session that I presented via Zoom on 31 March 2022 for National Indexing Day revealed a great deal of interest in e-book indexing, so further sessions on that topic will be planned too. That Zoom session ran very smoothly, and I plan to continue using the online format. We will also continue to schedule sessions at times that we hope will be convenient for members across Australia and New Zealand.

NID professional development: Using 'soft marketing' to building your indexing business

Although my talk had 'marketing' in the title, it was not about direct marketing techniques like advertising or maximising the number of hits on an indexer's website, or indeed making people realise why they should have an index at all. It was about how indexers can get work by using more subtle techniques.

Assuming that the potential client is seeking an indexer, the talk included tips on getting your name known; getting discovered when searchers don't know your name; having friends and colleagues who will recommend you; and finding people who need indexes, especially if you have specific topic expertise.

A key point was that people searching for an indexer will be reassured that you are genuine and competent if they hear of you or see your name in several places (eg. ANZSI Indexers Available, IPEd Editors Directory and LinkedIn or your own website, if you have one) or, better still, meet you in person. Other suggestions included Googling yourself, getting your name on your work and promoting your successes.

NID professional development: "Whom should we aim to please?"

I examined and reconsidered the question that was asked 20 years ago by Hazel Bell: "Whom should we aim to please?". My aim was to apply the question in the context of ebook indexes, and I based my presentation on my forthcoming article in the June 2022 (Vol 40, No 2) issue of *The Indexer: The International Journal of Indexing* (Coe, 2022).

Bell considered five sets of interested parties who all want slightly different things from an index. They are index users, the subject of indexes (or as she called them "the indexed"), authors, publishers and regulators (the people who set the standards or guidelines for book indexing). Each of those parties were considered in turn, reflecting on my doctoral research into how people find information in ebooks using indexes, full-text search tools and tables of contents.

After considering the viewpoint of these various parties, the conclusion was that index users are the people we should satisfy. I suggest that that creating indexes in the new medium of the ebook is a golden opportunity for considering new and innovative ways of creating indexes that will please their users.






